HANDBOOK REMINDER

Drop Off and Pick Up

When **dropping off** students, you may park on the road in front of steps. When **picking up**, you must park on either side of the street or in the parking spaces, but vehicles should NOT park in front of the steps. Students are not allowed to cross traffic on their own. Thank you for your cooperation in helping make for a safe transition.

Safety drills have been taking place during the first full month of school. We practice fire and tornado drills four times each year and intruder safety three times each year. Each practice drill is discussed on how to better improve the safety of students and staff.

A reminder about students who use crosswalks to get to and from school. Please remind your children to use the designated school crosswalks and always be sure to look both ways before crossing, especially if children are crossing G Avenue!


Testing at the elementary has just wrapped up! At the elementary level all TK-4 students take the FAST reading and math assessments. In grades 1-4, students also take the MAPS reading, language, and math assessments. The FAST tests help us see gaps in learning and provide guidance for effective interventions.

Our first Kids Club of the year saw an introduction to The Leader in Me with MANY leaders from our community there to cheer us on! It was a FANTASTIC turn out! We learned about the Franklin Covey 8 Habits, which are the base of The Leader in Me implementation. During small group Kids Club time, students learned about Habit 1 - Be Proactive! Each

from 7 Habits of Healthy Kids about being proud of who they were. Groups then worked on an activity where students learned about their own Circle of Control. This activity teaches that proactive people focus their time and energy on their Circle of Control - things they can directly affect. Reactive people focus on their Circle of NO Control - things they may worry about, but have no control.

On a weekend in September, I was able to attend the Plum Creek Literacy Festival in Seward, Nebraska. I met a lot of great authors and illustrators and left with more children's book knowledge and ideas of which authors might make a great match to visit Grundy Center Elementary someday!





There are a thousand different languages in the world, but a smile speaks them all!



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






WHAT DOES THE LEADER IN ME **IMPLEMENTATION LOOK LIKE?**




The 7 Habits



Habit 1: Be Proactive

Being proactive means you are in charge of your attitude and actions. You do the right thing even if it's not your responsibility or when no one is looking.



Habit 2: Begin With the End in Mind

This is when you look at a goal. You know what you want to accomplish, such as, get good grades, not get your folder marked, play the video game at home, and you do what you need to in order to accomplish that goal. You might take your time on a grade, listen instead of talk, or get all your chores done.



Habit 3: Put First Things First

This is all about work first, then play. Students know they

their centers before they can go to a free center. Sometimes, we have them do their homework before they go outside. This is

putting first things first.



When a problem comes up, students

should look for a compromise that makes both people happy. If he wants to play outside and his friend wants to stay in. Try 10 minutes outside and 10 minutes inside. This would make both of you happy!



Habit 5: Seek First to Understand, Then to be Understood

Listen to what others are trying to say before you start talking. Think about what

you want to say.



Habit 6: Synergize

When students synergize, they work with others to get ideas and collaborate. When they don't understand something, they seek someone for help.



Habit 7: Sharpen the Saw

To sharpen the saw is to balance work and play. Students need time to play! We work on these other habits to help get their work done on time, so they do have time to play. Just like at home, students should complete the chores or homework before playing what they want to!




One Community, One Book

Getting Involved at School

- Organize or assist with a specific club or interest group
- Have regular personalized communication with teacher/school
- Sew costumes or build sets for theatrical and musical productions
- Volunteer to speak in the classroom or at a career day
- Supervise or judge experiments at a science fair
- Be at parent training events
- Invite school visits to your home
- Be involved in interactive homework, tips, and tools for home learning
