# Welcome back!

It's going to be a fantastic year! I can already feel it in the air as teachers spend later days of their summer preparing their classrooms and curriculum for their students.

This is the beginning of my fourth year as Grundy Center Elementary principal. Another highlight for students this year will be the Mock Caldecott activity. Students LOVE to read and study some of the best books of the year and choose their own Caldecott winner!

We will, once again, be collaborating with Broadway actor, Hayley Podschun to learn about the fine arts and New York City. Hayley has plans to visit our school this fall as long as her work schedule allows. Hayley's visit will be made possible with a grant from the Iowa Arts Council, a division of the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs.

As with every new school year, a few new changes have been made you need to know. First, we are moving our elementary specials schedule to a 6-day cycle instead of a Monday through Friday cycle. This was a necessary change in order to

better utilize our art teacher, who is shared 50% of the time with Gladbrook-Reinbeck as well as equalizing the amount of minutes per specials class, avoiding an empty Wednesday afternoon of specials due



to an early out every other Wednesday, aligning our days with the m.s./h.s. for our shared district librarian, and keeping two professional learning community sessions per grade per cycle and not having them scheduled



at the end of the day where they could be lost due to an early school closing or a scheduled special activity. Another benefit occurs when there is no school. Instead of students missing out on those specials and teachers rewriting their lesson plans to reflect the next day's schedule, the entire school day can roll right over into the next day. Nobody misses a beat! Having taught with a 6-day cycle for many years, I have found it beneficial for students, teachers, and families.

Another change is the increased awareness we will have of visitors to the building. We do



ask that ALL visitors enter through the front door of the school building and stand on the maroon painted feet while pressing the doorbell. This will allow us to visibly see all guests who enter the building. All guests must also check into the office and receive a guest badge before continuing. We have also upgraded our intruder awareness and emergency procedures.

I am happy to announce we will continue our school wide multiage groups called Kids Club. Kids Club allows students from every grade to form their own smaller community within the school. Kids Club is held twice a month for 20 minutes and focuses on group building and positive character traits. This year

we will incorporate A SPARTAN PROMISE.

We have a new addition to the playground! The Grundy Center High School class of 1993 has donated a beautiful new Buddy Bench! We teach our students to be inclusive on the playground, but sometimes when someone feels left out and needs a buddy to play with, they can go and sit on the Buddy Bench. Thank you very much Class of '93!

Our Teacher Leadership and Compensation (TLC) program at the elementary is as strong as ever! We have Jan Lindeman returning as the student achievement coordinator (works





with

data and PLC groups), Sue Graham returning as the lead teacher (implements reading and math strategies), and Abby Hendershot returning as the mentor teacher (mentors new to the school staff). Joining them will be Jama Johnson and Geselle Steenhoek as building improvement team members (creates innovative ideas for future implementation).

We will again be collecting BOXTOPS! Last year, we raised over \$1,000 of those tiny little squares! We spread the work of preparing the BoxTops for mailing in among all the grades throughout the year. Thank you for your participation!

If you have not heard, there is a free app you may download that will give you allergen and nutrition information for our school lunches. The app is called YumYummi. Download it and give it a try!

Communication between teacher and parent is a critical component of student success at Grundy Center Elementary. Parents are encouraged to contact teachers via email or phone call to share successes and concerns.

### **Football Game Expectations**

# TRANSITIONAL KINDERGARTEN PROGRAMMING - NEW FOR SPRING 2019 -

Beginning in the spring of 2019, parents of students who will be 5 by September 15, 2019 may request to apply for their child to attend the Grundy Center Elementary transitional kindergarten program.

At this time, the 2019 transitional kindergarten program is being proposed as a full day program with enrollment limits in order to maintain appropriate teacher to student ratio and meet the needs of attending students.

After evaluation and input from a team of early childhood educators including the GCP&CC preschool teachers, the Grundy Center kindergarten and TK teachers, Central Rivers AEA early childhood and special education staff, and Grundy Center Schools administration, selected students will be invited to attend transitional kindergarten after kindergarten round-up in early April.
